Joan's Jottings

Matthew's Gospel for the First Sunday of Lent is about the temptations of Jesus. This Gospel offers us a good examination of conscience as we begin yet another Lent. Where do our true strength and fidelity lie? What is most important to us? In what direction will we focus our Lenten and on-going efforts for spiritual growth?

In order to answer these questions, we need to make some decisions. If we make a decision, then we have a choice. To have a choice means that there are alternatives – we can say yes or no when we are tempted. The free person has a choice and that very privilege also carries responsibility. There are some people who don't want or like to make choices. They want security, stability, and a simplicity that comes from a very fundamentalist approach to the Bible and to life. They want to equate life with a book that has all the answers so that responsibility lies not with them but with the word of Jesus. They want to know what they can **do** rather than **who** they should be.

The Church is wise in giving us this season of Lent because it is a time for us to check ourselves and find what is missing in our lives. Perhaps we'll find that we've lost something of value. Perhaps it was our patience or our integrity. We may have lost our temper or our respect for self or for others. We may have lost our capacity to understand or accept. Maybe we have lost a friend because of a misunderstanding or perhaps our desire to pray has left us. We may not even know for sure what we have lost but we know that something or someone is missing. There is an uncertainty about our lives that we need to set right.

Lent is a time of heightened sensitivity about the temptations we face and the losses we experience, in whatever form. The significance of today's story lies not in Christ's triumph alone but in our need for Christ's help in staving off evil powers and temptations that prevent us from becoming our true selves.

It is significant that whenever faced with trials, Jesus turned to God's word. We, too, face confusion, trial, struggle, and anxiety. While it is difficult, it is not all bad for in the process we may come to discover more deeply who God is and the person God is calling each of us to become. Welcome to another Lent!

STEPHEN MINISTRY



HOW DOES STEPHEN MINISTRY WORK?

Sometimes we find ourselves completely overwhelmed by our circumstances or our confusing thoughts and feelings. When we feel crushed by the weight of it all, what can we do? The best solution is to turn our lives over to the care of God, asking only for His will to be done.

Care is being with, crying out with, suffering with, feeling with. Care is compassion. Stephen Ministers have been trained to use their gifts of compassion and reflective listening as you open up to God's will in your life.

When someone requests a Stephen Minister, a Stephen Minister Referrals Coordinator will meet with that person, explain what Stephen Ministry is and help them determine whether Stephen Ministry is the kind of care needed. The Referrals Coordinator then matches the individual with one of our available Stephen Ministers. The Stephen Minister will then call that person and begin meeting with him or her for about an hour each week for as long as the need is there. *Everything* a Care Receiver says to his or her Stephen Minister is kept **confidential**. The Stephen Minister doesn't try to solve problems, rather, he or she listens, cares, prays, and helps the Care Receiver find his or her path to healing and wholeness.

Lenten News

- **Lenten Penitential Regulations**
 - Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of both fasting and abstinence.
 - All other Fridays during the season of Lent are days of abstinence.
 - Abstinence refers to not eating meat. All persons fourteen years of age and up are obliged to abstain.
 - Fasting refers to eating only one full meal a day with smaller portions that do not constitute a full meal at the other two meal times. Adults eighteen years of age up to the age of fifty-nine are obliged to fast.
- **Little Black Book for Lent** is available the weekend of March 5/6 for each household.
- **Lenten Penance Services:** Wednesday, **April 6th**, 11:30am and 7:00pm
- **Individual Confessions:** every Saturday (except April 23) from 4:00-4:30pm.
- **Holy Week:** Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion – regular weekend schedule
 - Tuesday, April 19th, Chrism Mass at Sacred Heart Cathedral, 7:30pm
 - Holy Thursday, April 21st, Mass of the Lord's Supper, 7:00pm; Blessed Sacrament Chapel open until 11:00pm for private adoration / Sign-up sheet in the narthex April 16/17
 - Good Friday, April 22nd, 3:00pm; Celebration of the Lord's Passion
7:00pm; Taize Prayer around the Cross
 - Easter Vigil, April 23rd, 7:30pm
 - Easter Sunday, April 24th, Masses at 8:30am and 10:30am.

The Roman Missal

During the month of February, the homilies and reflections included a study of the parts of the Mass. This was done to deepen our appreciation of the Eucharist. In the event that anyone missed the updates about the Mass that were in the bulletin, here they are. They provide a good review for all of us on our essential act of worship and a guide for helping parents prepare their children to better understand the Mass.

Whenever we gather to celebrate Mass, we gather as the people of God. Together we are the Body of Christ, and together we pray what we believe. The **Introductory Rites** of the Mass gather us, invite us into the journey we share, and remind us that although we are individual people, we are one body as believers. We begin in song, where our individual voices are joined together to praise God. The Sign of the Cross marks us as baptized in Christ. The Act of Penitence has us standing before God as people with human frailties who pray first for mercy. Then in joy and gratitude to the God who loves us, we raise our voices in the Gloria. The Opening Prayer (Collect) allows us to call to mind our own prayers, and the celebrant collects them into a prayer that he makes in the name of the whole community. All the actions of the Introductory Rites are designed to remind us that although we are many, we are one in the Lord. **For reflection:** When I gather to celebrate Mass, what helps me connect to my community of believers? What attitudes do I need to assume to help me participate fully in this believing community gathered to praise the Lord?

The **Liturgy of the Word** is the part of the Mass where we hear the Word of God proclaimed. The readings from the Old and New Testaments are an opportunity for us to hear and understand more completely the Word of God. We respond to the proclamation of the Word in silence, reflecting on what we have heard and by singing or reciting a Psalm. Then, as one, we stand to hear the Gospel proclaimed. These readings from Matthew, Mark, Luke and John relate the words and deeds of our Lord. We sit to listen to the Homily, reflections on how the power of the Word informs and challenges us today. Then, we stand together to pray the Creed, the words that express our deeply held beliefs as a community of believers. We pray this prayer together, articulating the beliefs of the whole community and claiming them as our own. Finally, we gather the Prayer of the Faithful together, and ask God to hear them for our sake, for the sake of the Church and its leaders, for the sake of the world, and for the needs of its people living and dead. **For reflection:** How can I enter more fully into the Word I hear proclaimed at Mass? Can I make a commitment to read the readings for the day before Mass and again after Mass, and then ask, "How do the readings of the day challenge me in my everyday life?"

The **Liturgy of the Eucharist** reveals the heart of the believing community's action: the memorial of Jesus' death and resurrection. During this time we actively participate in both a meal and a sacrifice. In the Preparation of the Gifts of bread and wine, we present our lives as an offering to God. In the Eucharistic Prayer, we give thanks and praise for God's wonderful works on our behalf, especially in Christ Jesus. We also proclaim the central mystery of our faith: "When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup, we proclaim your death, O Lord, until you come again." Our faith tells us that, at the consecration, the bread and wine on our altar become the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. When we receive the Body and Blood of Christ in Communion, we respond, "Amen," which means, "I believe." **For reflection:** How do I prepare myself to receive the gift of Jesus Christ into my heart and my life? What does the gift of Jesus Christ mean for me?

After entering into communion with Christ and one another as the Body of Christ, we prepare to go forth into the world. During the Concluding Rites, we bow our heads and receive a blessing, we make the sign of the cross, and we are sent forth to carry the Word of God into and to be the presence of Christ in the world. We are to go forth in peace and live what we have celebrated. **For reflection:** What does it mean to take Eucharist into the world? How am I Jesus for another? How is she/he Jesus for me? What one thing can I do this week that will embody Jesus for others?

What Is Tithing?

Tithing is the practice, established by God in the Old Testament, of returning 10% of your blessings to God. Originally the tithe was given to the temple or the Church in the form of produce or livestock, since this really was the only income that the people had. As our society shifted from a barter-based system of trade to a monetary exchange system, the tithe began to be paid in currency. Whether one gave monetary income or profit from the fields was really not as important as it was for the believer to understand that the tithe was what was owed to God. The tithe was not given based on the needs of the priest, of the Church or of the poor. It was given simply in recognition and gratitude for the blessings that God had bestowed on the individual. Thus, every believer had a need to tithe to God.

“The tithes of the herd and the flock shall be determined by ceding to the Lord as sacred every tenth animal as they are counted by the herdsman’s rod.” Leviticus 27:32

The Church is to tithe:

“Give the Levites these instructions: When you receive from the Israelites the tithes I have assigned you from them as your heritage, you are to make a contribution from them to the Lord, a tithe of the tithes.”

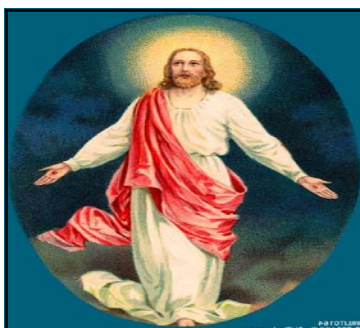

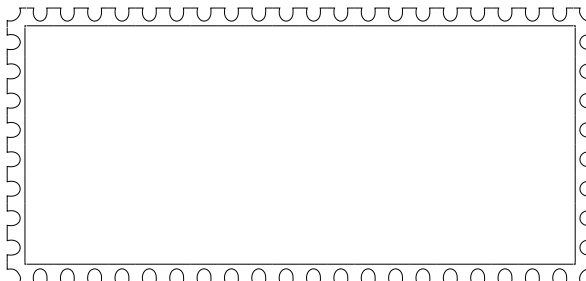
